

LPCO Legislative Director Position Description

Overview

The Legislative Director informs the membership and board of bills being proposed and voted in the State Legislature that Libertarians may want to voice their opinion(s).

The Legislative Director also serves as one of the eleven members of the State Board.

Key Responsibilities

- Monitor activity in the State Legislature, communicate with that body, develop legislation or issue-oriented committees and work with other organizations on areas of mutual concern.
- Track bills and hearings, identify priority issues, and keep party leaders and activists focused on where their efforts matter most.
- Inform our membership about times and days public input is being taken for bills in committees.
- Work with the Campaigns Director regarding Colorado political issues that may part of candidate platforms.
- Work with the Fundraising Director so LPCO fundraising efforts do not compete with candidate fundraising activities.
- Attend LPCO Board meetings and participate in discussions and decision-making. Board meetings are currently held during the evening on the second Monday of each month.
- Provide a short director report each month, prior to the LPCO board meeting.

Qualifications

- Must be a sustaining member of the LPCO. To be a sustaining member you must be registered as a Libertarian in Colorado and either be a lifetime member of the National Party or have paid annual dues of \$25.00 to the Libertarian Party of Colorado.
- Agree to sign the Statement of Principles of the National Libertarian Party and a statement disavowing the initiation of force to achieve political or social goals.
- Strong communication and organizational skills.
- Commitment to the principles and mission of the Libertarian Party.

Term & Election

- The Legislative Director is a 2-year term and is elected at the LPCO State Convention in even-numbered years.
- The Legislative Director may be re-elected for consecutive terms.

Impact

The Legislative Director keeps the Party informed about bills so our membership can testify in support or against bills that have may an impact on our Libertarian values.
